Dear Friends,

Our son, Feliks, is applying to an art program for the 11th and 12th grades of high school at a boarding school in a town a few hours from us. I'm of the "open up opportunities and let them fly" school of parenting and if he gets in, I'll be the biggest cheerleader for his ability to do this hard thing, even though sometimes it seems impossible. Is he ready? Will his Asperger's make it too difficult for him? Will being transgender be safe there? We'll never know until he leaps. And I respect him enough to let him try.

When I was his age, my parents opened up the opportunity for me to be an exchange student in Sri Lanka, no doubt with some of the same concerns (and some different ones). That experience fundamentally changed my life. Let them fly before you think they're ready. Let them surprise you. And let yourself fly. Falling is *always* possible, whether you fly or don't, so why not fly and learn important things about yourself on the way up, and sometimes on the way down?

Here are a few things from my week that may be of interest to you:

1. The end of the year is known for "best of" lists, and this one tops my list right now: The 50 Best Nonfiction Books of the Past 25 years. My top picks from this list include The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander, The Warmth of Other Suns by Isabel Wilkerson, Far From the Tree by Andrew Solomon, and The Old Ways by Robert Macfarlane.
